Certification in IT Asset Disposition

The IAITAM Certified IT Asset Disposal (CITAD) training course prepares individuals to manage the IT asset disposal process within an organisation. Best practices in IT Asset Disposition (ITAD) are broken down into policy management, data security and chain of custody transitioning.

With IAITAM's best practice approach, ITAD processes will no longer be viewed as a corporate overhead, but instead, if managed correctly, they can be a profit center and mitigate areas of risk.

The Agenda

Attendees whose job responsibilities include ITAD will take away the knowledge of how to avoid risk of data loss and public exposure that surround a breakdown in ITAD process management. The course will teach delegates how to mitigate risks associated with improper disposition of IT assets and determine the appropriate path for their organisation.

- Importance of vendor management

The CITAD training course is an interactive two-day instructor led training course, held classroom-style or online. The modules are split into four 3-hour sessions.



Who Should Attend?

The CITAD training course is designed for individuals with minimal to no experience in the field of Asset Management. It is essential learning for those responsible for ITAD programs and other IT professionals involved in asset management, resource budgeting, finance, software licensing, contract management and strategic planning. Although there are no prerequisites, some knowledge of an organisation's life cycle management is encouraged.

The CITAD training course consists of the following components:

- Course material
- Course presentation slide book
- Daily instructor-led presentation and interaction with attendees (administered in-person or online)
- Optional CITAD comprehensive online examination necessary for achieving the CITAD Certification
